

Public Officials Forum Monday, October 2, 2017

WEF is pleased to provide the Public Officials Forum, designed for and available only to elected and appointed members of public utilities' governing bodies. The Public Officials Forum, made up of a luncheon and two sessions, will provide an opportunity for participants to expand their knowledge of issues critical to effective governance, share experiences with each other through facilitated discussion, and ask national industry leaders questions in a safe environment, free from utility staff members. Topics to be covered include affordability and challenges with fullcosting of services, the role of the private sector (manufacturers, consultants, private capital, private operators), and an overview of WEFTEC to help Public Officials get the most from their time in Chicago.

Loss of confidence in government and in water utilities, in particular as a result of Flint, puts much more pressure on governing bodies to understand the critical issues facing their utilities and the need for appropriate resourcing and decision-making in the public interest. Professional staff and management must receive the appropriate guidance, support, and direction from their governing bodies to help re-build lost trust in government. The quality of governance is key to the high performance of public utilities, particularly as we are now at a juncture of significant potential change in the political climate and available resources. Public and appointed officials have few venues for education and awareness of issues and for networking. This session provides the opportunity for both education and networking, while also serving as the introduction to the industry and the education possible at WEFTEC.

Part 1: Luncheon and Industry Overview

The first part of the Public Officials Forum is a lunch that includes an overview of the industry and WEFTEC, as well as a keynote about rates and financing issues.

11:30-1:30 Public Officials Forum Part I: Luncheon and Industry Overview

At this lunch, a general overview of the water and wastewater treatment process will provide a firm foundation for the participants so they are all starting from the same base of education. An outline of the industry and WEFTEC will be provided to highlight the opportunities available at WEFTEC including recommended sessions and activities. The keynote speaker, Eric Rothstein, will provide basic information about rates and financing issues, which are key to all utilities, no matter their size or location. In particular, Eric will focus on affordability and full-cost pricing of utility services. Mr. Rothstein brings some direct experience with Flint and Detroit that provide wonderful context for many of the issues every utility board is facing or may be facing in the near future. Networking time with others is built into the agenda so you will have ample opportunity to meet public officials from other cities and exchange ideas and contact information.

Keynote Presentation: Navigating Needed Rate Increases and Water Affordability: The Business Case for Compassion

Eric Rothstein Biography:

Eric has over 30 years of experience in water, wastewater, and stormwater utility financial and strategic planning. His recent projects include serving on the Michigan Governor's Flint Water Advisory Task Force, as program manager for establishment of the Great Lakes Water Authority, and the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department's Blue Ribbon Panel on Affordability and Drainage Charge Program.

Eric served as Jefferson County, AL's rate consultant and municipal advisor for litigation related to the County's bankruptcy and issuance of \$1.7 billion in sewer warrants. Since 2003, Eric has led strategic financial planning for the City of Atlanta's Department of Watershed Management, and prepared the City's Financial Capability-Based Schedule Extension Report. For several permittees (Atlanta, Akron, EBMUD, Honolulu, Guam, NEORSD, ST. Louis), Eric has provided strategic and financial consulting and negotiation support services on financial capability assessment and low-income affordability issues.

Eric is a contributing author of the WEF <u>Financing and Charges for Wastewater Systems</u> and AWWA <u>Principles of Water Rates, Fees and Related Charges</u> Manual of Practices. He is chair of WEF's Technical Practices Committee and continues to serve on the national AWWA Competitive Practices and Rates & Charges Committees and the WEF and NACWA Utility Management Committees.

Eric has an MA in Economics from the University of California-Davis, and an AB in Economics & History from Ripon College, Ripon, WI.

Part II: Session on Issues of the Industry

The second part of the Forum is the late afternoon session, which provides education on the topics important to the industry, and gives a view of the different sectors that provide vital services and equipment. These private sector leaders will go into depth on the topics relevant for today, including balancing risk and innovation, the role of different industry sectors, workforce issues, and the overall direction of water and wastewater.

3:30-5:00 Public Officials Forum Part II: Issues of the Industry

This session, open only to public officials, will cover the issues the industry faces in more depth, and provide perspectives from different sectors of the industry. A panel of private sector leaders will provide that perspective on their company and sector and then participate in a facilitated discussion answering questions and providing observations. These private sector leaders include equipment providers, consultants, and the financial sector. Each brings many years of experience in the water industry and will share unique insights to educate public officials on many topics relevant to the industry.

Sandra Ralston, WEF Fellow

Principal, Consensus LLC
